The Pennsylvania Board of Social Work Examiners recognizes and accepts Psychology continuing education hours/credits for social workers. Social workers will receive the Certificate of Attendance. Students must attend all day to receive CE credits, sign in and sign out at the end of the day, and successfully complete all assignment and evaluation forms.

CERTIFIED COUNSELORS: Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine's Department of Psychology is recognized by the National Board of Certified Counselors to offer continuing education for National Certified Counselors. We adhere to NBCC Continuing Education Guidelines (PROVIDER #5672). Eighteen CE hours/credits each for CBT I, II, III, and six CE hours/credits for CBT IV or 60 CE hours/credits for the entire series are awarded for NBCC counselors who complete the entire Cognitive Behavior Therapy Series. Students must attend all day to receive CE credits, sign in and sign out at the end of the day and successfully complete all assignments and evaluation forms.

These programs complement our present Master's programs in Counseling and Clinical Health Psychology and Organizational Development and Leadership and our PsyD Programs in Clinical Psychology and School Psychology. We are also very proud to announce that our PsyD in School Psychology has been accredited by the National Association of School Psychologists and is listed as a Designated Program by the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards. Our PsyD Program in Clinical Psychology is accredited by the American Psychological Association.

The MS in School Psychology is a way to enrich your professional life or prepare for a specific career in School Psychology. The degree is a 33-credit program completed in 14 months. The EdS Degree in School Psychology prepares master's level professionals interested in working in the schools as a psychologist and can be completed in three years. Our coursework and supervised practicum placements and internship in schools will prepare you to practice as a highly qualified professional and help fill the current national shortage of school psychologists.

The MS in Counseling and Clinical Health Psychology prepares individuals to work in the mental health field, providing evaluation, counseling, and therapy services. Students may choose to pursue a 48-credit track or a 60-credit track specializing in Addictions and Offender Counseling. Both tracks emphasize a cognitive behavioral approach to treatment and prepare individuals for licensure as a professional counselor.

The MS in Organizational Development and Leadership prepares students to be effective leaders of organizational change. You learn practical skills that help you to be more effective in your work and personal life. We focus on the individual, team, and system levels of an organization. Graduates advance their careers because they increase the value they bring to their organizations.

Cognitive Behavior Therapy I

INTRODUCTION TO COGNITIVE THERAPY

SEPTEMBER 17, OCTOBER 15 AND NOVEMBER 19, 2011

The goal of this introductory course is to focus on the theoretical, historical, philosophical and technical basis of Cognitive Behavior Therapy. An integral part of the course will be to develop an understanding of current therapeutic models covering basic techniques, strategies and conceptualizations.

TOPICS TO BE COVERED INCLUDE:

- Depression
- Phobias and anxiety disorders
- Developing client-therapist rapport
- Structuring the therapy session
- Setting the agenda
- Cognitive and behavioral strategies
- Issues of compliance, resistance and termination

Successful completion of this course will be demonstrated through required readings and a written examination.

Participants already familiar with the theories of Cognitive Therapy may request a waiver for this course. A written examination may be required to determine mastery of material. All other courses must be taken in sequence. Please contact our office for more details.

About the Faculty

Arthur Freeman, EdD, ABPP, is professor and former chairman of the Department of Psychology at PCOM. He was a senior consultant and supervisor at the Center for Cognitive Therapy at the University of Pennsylvania for 17 years. Dr. Freeman holds diplomates in clinical psychology, behavioral psychology and family psychology from the American Board of Professional Psychology and is a fellow of the American Psychological Association. He is past president of the Association for Advancement of Behavior Therapy. Dr. Freeman has published 50 books and 55 journal articles, reviews and commentaries. His works have been translated into Bulgarian, Chinese, Dutch, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish and Swedish. He has been visiting professor at the Universities of Gothenburg and Umea in Sweden, Shanghai Second Medical University in the

People's Republic of China and the University of Catania in Italy. He has presented seminars and workshops in 30 countries over the past 27 years.

Robert A. DiTomasso, PhD, ABPP is professor and chairman of the Department of Psychology. He is a diplomate in clinical psychology of the American Board of Professional Psychology, a fellow of the Academy of Clinical Psychology and a founding fellow of the Academy of Cognitive Therapy. He earned his doctoral degree in professional-scientific psychology at the University of Pennsylvania where he received the William E. Arnold Award in recognition of outstanding leadership and scholarship. He completed a clinical psychology internship under the direction of the late Joseph Wolpe, MD at the Behavior Therapy Unit of Eastern Pennsylvania Psychiatric Institute, Temple University School of Medicine, Department of Psychiatry. He has extensive teaching experience, having served as

adjunct associate professor at the University of Pennsylvania for many years. For 19 years, he served as associate director of behavioral medicine at the West Jersey Health System Family Medicine Residency. His specialty is the cognitive behavioral treatment of anxiety and anxiety-related medical disorders as well as primary care psychology. Dr. DiTomasso teaches in the APA-Accredited PsyD program in Clinical Psychology. He has published three books and 50 chapters, articles and reviews. Dr. DiTomasso edited a book entitled *Comparative Treatments of Anxiety Disorders* with Elizabeth Gosch, PhD, for Springer Publishers. His most recent book with Barbara Golden, PsyD, ABPP, and Harry Morris, DO, MPH, entitled *The Handbook of Cognitive Behavioral Approaches in Primary Care*, was recently published by Springer Publishers.
