

strong focus of improving diabetes care. It took me time and persistence to find meaningful opportunities to serve. While attending the 2011 Annual Meeting, I worked diligently networking with fellow educators. My focus was to learn how to jump feet first into serving through AADE. I recall a conversation with Dr. Sue Cornell, in which I shared my aspiration to get involved and serve through AADE. After that discussion, Dr. Cornell agreed to become my mentor.

My first assignment in AADE was reviewing scholarship applications for the Pharmacy Community of Interest (COI). I joined the leadership team in fall 2012, and assisted with planning the 2013 Annual Meeting as a member of the Annual Meeting Planning Committee. I continued my service within the Pharmacy COI as COI Leader for 2014, where the role included coordinating networking sessions at the annual meeting, writing monthly blogs and securing volunteers for committees. market. This involved learning about several guidelines for industry that the FDA has released in effort to speed the approval of generic drugs, provide more competition, and lower-cost alternatives. I learned about the different modules contained in a Abbreviated New Drug Application (ANDA) submission. I also learned about the response letters and various types of deficiencies that can be issued by the FDA regarding pending submissions.

Over the course of a few months, I was given various responsibilities which included research projects, presentations, and participation in department meetings.

In addition, I had the responsibility of providing monthly updates to the regulatory and marketing departments consisting of major news and developments within the U.S regulatory landscape. It was particularly interesting to see the generic competition to be first to file when patents for brand products are close to expiration or have become invalidated.


The first project I was tasked with was presenting on various types of citizen petitions submitted to the FDA. Citizen petitions are requests made to the FDA to issue, amend, or revoke regulated products or agency procedures. One of the benefits for generic companies that can result from these petitions is obtaining permission from the FDA to submit a ANDA for a product that differs from the reference listed drug whether it may be a change to the dosage form, strength, or route of administration. Following my presentation, the Vice President of Global Regulatory Affairs gave me a project of breaking down a citizen petition recently granted by Janet Woodcock, director of the Center for Drug Evaluation and Research (CDER) at the FDA. This petition allowed an open docket for scientists and industry experts to suggest alternative methods for bioequivalence testing that would obviate the need for blood level studies to establish bioequivalence between brand products and generics. This was a great experience for me to research into a fresh industry topic and inform directors from several departments including Research & Development and Pharmacokinetics.

Overall, the internship program at Apotex was extremely rewarding and informative. I learned much more than I could have ever expected over the span of two months. As a pharmacy student, it was interesting to see all the legwork and regulations put in place to receive approval from the FDA for drugs products that we learn about daily. This experience was both academically and professionally challenging and gave me a real-life look into the role pharmacists can play in the industry setting.
