

GA-PCOM SIMULATION CENTER: TECHNOLOGY FOR THE FUTURE OF HEALTH CARE



GA-PCOM Simulation Center

As the Georgia Campus-PCOM continues to expand, the center has been renovated to provide additional space and include cutting-edge technology. This has created a technologically advanced simulation lab for students in various disciplines, allowing them to hone some of the most important skills they will learn in school: interviewing and examining patients.

Through the use of patient actors, the Simulation Center gives GA-PCOM students a supportive environment in which to practice clinical skills, develop crucial communication abilities, and demonstrate clinical competence prior to treating real patients. With its emphasis on teaching and instruction, the Simulation Center can also serve as a center for medical education research and as a potential training facility for emergency first responders, including paramedics, nurses and law enforcement personnel. Gifts were made in support of the Simulation Center by the PCOM Alumni Association and the Community Foundation for Northeast Georgia.

SARA SOMERS RUPERT, RN '33 WHITE COAT ENDOWMENT FUND

On August 18, 2016, PCOM's Physician Assistant Studies class of 2018 took their first steps toward careers as competent and compassionate healthcare professionals during the program's White Coat Ceremony. This ceremony is a significant rite of passage for students beginning their healthcare training that stresses professionalism, scientific proficiency and compassionate care for the patient.



DAVID MILLER, DO '60 MEMORIAL RESEARCH DAY AWARDS

On May 3, 2017, the David Miller, DO '60 Memorial Research Day Awards were presented to four students in recognition of their superlative work and professional poster presentations. These awards were made possible through a gift from his daughter Sheryl Miller, MD in memory of her father.

Mihoko Tanabe (DO '19) was the recipient of the Excellence in Research—Best in Show for "Family Planning in Refugee Settings: Findings from a Multi-Country Study", which analyzed the adequacy and effectiveness of family planning in refugee settings in multiple countries.

Noah Sideman (PsyD '19) was the recipient of the Excellence in Research—Psychology award for "Task fMRI and Functional Connectivity Show Concordant Memory Laterality in Temporal Lobe Epilepsy."

Anahi McIntyre (MS/Biomed '18) was the recipient of the Excellence in Research—Masters in Biomedical Sciences award for "Protein Kinase C Epsilon Peptide Inhibitor Exerts Cardioprotective Effects in Myocardial Ischemia/Reperfusion Injury," a presentation that described her research

suggesting that protein kinase C epsilon has the potential to improve cardiac function and reduce infarct size following ischemia and reperfusion of the heart.

Vanessa Valdivia (DO '21) was the recipient of the Excellence in Alzheimer's Disease Research award for the "Evaluation of Smell and miRNA Biomarkers in Alzheimer's Disease (AD)," which identified correlations between mental status, ability to identify scents and appearance of miRNAs in saliva.
