Our Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) program equips students with the technical skills and knowledge needed to work in a variety of healthcare settings, including hospitals, clinics, schools and sports facilities. This training enables them to examine, diagnose, treat and prevent movement dysfunction and impairments associated with chronic conditions, in addition to providing pain management.

Not only are physical therapists in high demand, but they also achieve a high level of job satisfaction. Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine (PCOM) trains students to work one-on-one with individuals to improve their quality of life by providing wellness-oriented care and promoting healthy lifestyles in a flexible, versatile and rewarding field.

PROGRAM BASICS

Students are actively engaged in Interprofessional Education (IPE) on and off campus, reflecting the collaborative approach needed to advise and consult with other healthcare professionals.

The DPT program's curriculum includes both coursework and experiential training in a variety of settings. As part of 134 credit hours of coursework, students gain essential, real-world understanding through 34 weeks of full-time clinical education. In their third year of study, students engage with specific areas of interest through electives.
